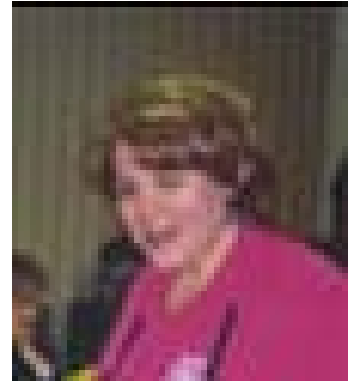

Evidence of Easter



As Easter approaches, I have been thinking a lot about the leap of faith it takes to believe in Christ's resurrection. I have also been thinking about the popularity

of crime scene investigation TV shows like *CSI*, *NCIS*, and *CSI: Miami*. More than half of the top 10 rated television shows fall into the category of "police procedurals". Why do we like these kinds of shows? It seems to me we like them because it is comforting to see hard evidence and straight forward resolution. We know at the end of *CSI* the investigators will solve the crime. There is no ambiguity. The facts will be known, and the case will be closed. But unfortunately for us, there could never be a *CSI: Easter*. Even Detective Lilly Rush from *Cold Case* would not be able to return to Jerusalem and find concrete evidence of the resurrection.

But perhaps if we are looking for evidence of Easter, we should turn our eyes elsewhere. I have been reading the thoughts of Rev. Dr. Guy Sayles, and he believes that the best evidence of Easter is to be found right here and now. He says, if you want to see proof of the resurrection, "the answer is look to the church".

The early church leapt into existence when those first disciples realized they had an unbroken and unbreakable connection to Jesus Christ. Emboldened by that connection, they lived in their world with such passion and compassion, such love and grace, such generosity and power, that the only plausible explanation for their life together was the presence and the power of the risen Christ.

Early in the book of Acts, we find this description of their life together: *They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of the bread, and the prayers. Awe came upon everyone, because many wonders and signs were being done by the apostles. All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all as any had need. Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate food*

with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved (Acts 2:34-47).

Such joy, compassion, generosity and love had only one plausible explanation: Jesus was with them. Because Jesus was with them, they gave themselves on behalf of the broken, bruised, and battered. They had deep love for one another, tender compassion for their neighbors, and passionate devotion to God.

But even though that church was aglow with the presence of Jesus, it wasn't a perfect church. It was no less human and flawed than our church. The book of Acts describes this church as a bold and shining witness to the resurrection, but it also tells us that the early church was often embroiled in conflict and controversy.

The good news is that if that oh-so-human and imperfect bunch could rise with Jesus to be a witness to the resurrection, then maybe we can too. It is true that as we gather together, break the bread, tell our stories, sing our songs, pray our prayers, care for those in need, work for peace, and struggle for justice, we find that Jesus is alive among us.

If you want evidence of Easter, call to mind the faces and the faithfulness of the people in our church. When musicians rehearse long hours to lead us in the praise of God, it is a sign of the resurrection. When we collect clothes and soap for Repairers of the Breach Homeless Shelter, it is a sign of the resurrection. When a person, tired from working hard all week, stays up late on Saturday night to prepare a Faith Zone lesson and comes early on Sunday to welcome the kids to our church, it is evidence of the risen Christ. When death is faced honestly and hopefully, when the church opens its heart and its doors to whomever comes yearning for the love of God, I am convinced that Jesus is alive.

As our Sanctuary Choir sings in that great anthem "God Has No Hands But Our Hands", over and over again, by God's grace, the simple and ordinary practices of the church are the means by which Jesus becomes real to us and to the world.

Repairers of the Breach Milwaukee's Only Daytime Homeless Shelter.

The Repairers' mission is: To bring forth homeless people to act collectively to change the present conditions under which they live, through advocacy/ education and direct action.

Or, in words that can keep a room full of teenagers listening: the Repairers is the only shelter in Milwaukee that opens its doors during the day for homeless people to get off their feet, take a shower, pick up some new clothes, and so much more.

The Repairers is run and staffed almost entirely by people who are currently or who have been recently homeless. The people who use the services of the Repairers are not tenants or customers, they are members. The Repairers remind its members that they do have the power to make positive changes in their lives, in the lives of people around them, and to the whole world!

I have never encountered so many amazing stories of God's impact on the lives of men, women, and children in any other place. Every visit the youth group makes to the Repairers, we meet a few more people who have amazing testimonies to tell.

During our last visit, we met a man who came to the Repairers to sell drugs to easy customers. The day he entered the building was the day he quit selling drugs. He was so moved by the people he met and the love he felt that he abandoned his own car, full of cash and drugs, and actually chose to be homeless rather than to continue selling drugs. He has been helping at the Repairers of the Breach since that day.

I haven't taken a group of teens to the Repairers for even one day that hasn't shown prolific change in their attitudes after returning. This organization does good in more ways than I think anybody understands. Every week I am reminded of the impact our visits to the Repairers has had on the Senior High Youth Group and every week I thank God for the opportunity to take our teens to this amazing establishment.

Thank you to all of you who brought donations of clothing and toiletries for our March visit to "Repairers".

Green County Food Pantry

Sunday, April 5, containers will be placed at the entrances for non-perishable food items or personal care items for the Green County Food Pantry.

Please check the expiration dates as outdated items cannot be used and dented and rusty cans cannot be used.

In the month of February 186 boxes of food were distributed to 337 adults and 186 children for a total of 523. In February 212 pounds of food was donated by St. John's.

Special thanks to Stewart and Christie Strait, who come on Monday morning and take the Sunday collection to the Food Pantry. The delivery of the food collection from Sunday, March 1, reported 190 pounds of food was donated by St. John's.

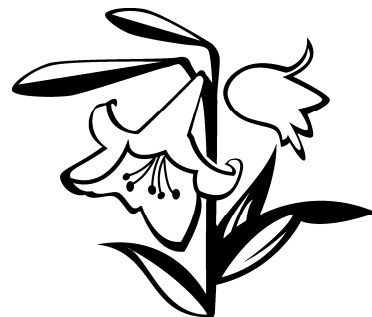
My deepest desire is for each of you to rekindle that relationship with God during this holy season.

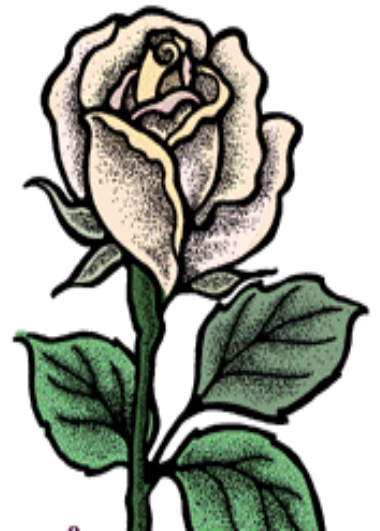

April Service Group 10

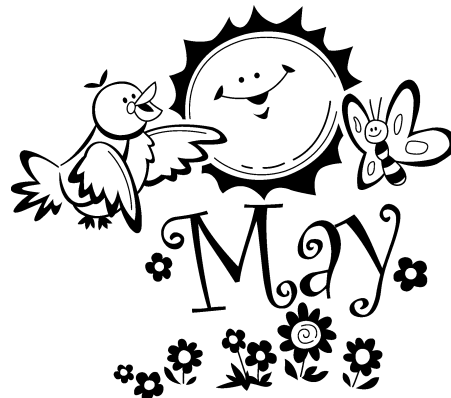
